WOODS HOLE SCHOOL HISTORY

The original school for the village of Woods Hole was located at the head of Little Harbor, on a high bluff above Little Harbor. This small building was shared with the villagers as a meeting or “gathering” place since there was no church at that time nor even an assembly hall anywhere in the village.

School Street was laid out in 1846. In 1851 Joseph Story Fay, who had arrived in Woods Hole the year before and who had begun buying many parcels of land throughout the village, presented to the Town of Falmouth for \$1.00 a lot on School Street for the erection of a school house and for other public purposes.

On the 1858 Walling Map of Barnstable County, a school building was marked on the School Street lot although there is no record that documents the abandonment of the Little Harbor school. In 1867 the Town Meeting voted to sell off at Public Auction all school houses and lots not being used for any school purposes. In 1870 the Town Meeting voted to appoint a committee of three “to take the matter of additional school accommodations at Woods Hole into consideration and be authorized to sell the present building or add to the same build a new house”

A new school building, a plain two-story Victorian in Greek Revival style, was then built, probably during 1870. This structure was built beyond the lines of the lot previously given to the Town onto the adjacent lot owned by Fay. At the time of the building of the new two-schoolhouse, there were three houses on the second lot. One of them may have been used as a school, but there is no documentation to prove this.

In 1885 the Town voted to expand the 1870 school building. Fay sold the adjacent land and houses to the Town for \$3,500. In the same year, the house which may have been used as a school, was moved (according to legend) on the winter ice across Eel Pond to the corner of Bar Neck Road and West Street (now Albatross Street) by Shubael Norton. Another house, a gambrel-roofed bracketed cottage, was moved by Fay onto his own property and eventually served as the home of his gardener, Michael Walsh. The third building was demolished.

Staircases and entrance porches were attached to each side of the expanded building and a new cupola added. The cost of the land, existing houses, labor and materials was \$8844.00.

In 1913 the newly formed Children’s School of Science began to use the school. At first the school had a mixed curriculum of dancing, singing and some science. Later biological science became the basis for the school’s teaching. Many of the children who attended were the offspring of scientists, particularly those at the M.B.L., and the village’s atmosphere of scientific investigation provided a natural background for the school. Mrs. Gray and Mrs. Lillie, the first presidents, fostered the philosophy of Louis Agassiz which had influenced the M.B.L.: “Study Nature, Not Books”.

Generations of families who lived in Woods Hole attended the school. In the early 1900s, the School held six grades. By the 1950s it held five grades. Children were then sent to the Hall School for 6th grade. Later on, there were only 4 grades at the Woods Hole School.

In 1981 the \$45,000. one-year operating expense was deleted from the town school budget because of a Proposition 2 ½ override and a recommendation from School Superintendent Robert V. Antonucci to the school board. The school board gave the village the option of raising the money themselves by August 15th. Spearheaded by Tom Renshaw, president of the Woods Hole Community Association, 1800 letters went out to the community in an effort to save the school from closing. The school was described as one of the oldest continuously operating schools in the United States.

Closing the school had been discussed for many years. Its detractors claimed that its operating costs were too high and its proponents stating that it was “unique, efficient and historically significant to the village”.

Eventually, about \$51,000. was raised to keep the school open was raised to keep the school open just one more year (1982). No further money was allotted after this except for maintenance and one teacher’s salary. A new law gave the school committee jurisdiction for five years after the school ceased to be a regular part of the school program. Other uses for the building were discussed, including the leasing of the building to the Children’s School of Science, a day care center and a Head Start pre-school.

The last day of classes was June 25, 1982.

On a form and letter dated January 26, 1982, the Falmouth Historical Commission submitted an application to the Massachusetts Historical Commission to place the Woods Hole School building on the National Register of Historic Places. In November 1982 the Falmouth Historical Commission was informed that the school had been accepted for listing. A bronze plaque was placed on the façade of the school in 1986.

The Children’s School of Science continues to use the school during July and August. The building is leased and maintained by the Community Association of Woods Hole but is still owned by the Town of Falmouth. The Woods Hole Community Association has always been dedicated to maintaining programs for children in the school. Since 1982 they have constantly improved the condition and appearance of the historic building.

SCOPE

The Woods Hole School collection contains a number of documents such as the deeds to the property on School Street, Woods Hole (1851, 1885), both gifts of Joseph Story Fay, and some original correspondence from the period 1870s-1880s about schools in the town of Falmouth as well as material about the expansion of the school building in 1885-1886. Although the school house expansion was described as a “new school house”, it was an expansion and renovation of the existing c. 1870 Greek Revival school house.

Examples of reading primers from 1891-1901, 1920s, 1930s and 1960s are included. There are class directories, correspondence and many newsclippings, especially about the long-fought effort to keep the school open in a period of dwindling class sizes and financial support from the Town of Falmouth during the 1970s and 1980s, culminating in its closure as a public school.

Because of the first-ever all-class reunion of the Woods Hole School in 2006, many photos – some originals but mostly digital prints made from originals kindly shared and loaned temporarily by former students – were scanned and made into permanent photo prints to show the history of the school, its students, staff and activities from 1900 to the 1980s. An entire box is devoted to photographs. Several albums of special events and activities have also been donated. In addition to the prints filed in the box, there are four notebooks with copies of class photos, marked with identities by former students at the reunion, 2006.
