## From the Editors

In 1987 Jane McLaughlin wrote the lead article for the new journal *Spritsail*. Now, 31 years later, she has distilled her experiences as an assistant to one of Woods Hole's most famous scientists. She spent her professional life in the laboratory of Nobel Prize winner Albert Szent-Györgyi and recalls the scientific brilliance of this Hungarian refugee as well as his profound generosity to other scientists. He shared his love of life and his special fondness for living near the ocean with all who knew him.

Today Falmouth boasts at least a score of book clubs. The *Enterprise* recently featured the Classics Book Club, which has both men and women and just celebrated its 100<sup>th</sup> classic read since its founding 13 years ago. Most numerous are the many women's groups, but there are some men-only groups, as well as a few with a specific focus like science fiction.
