WHALING LOGS BEING SCANNED AND DIGITIZED

The Woods Hole Foundation has given a grant to us and Falmouth Historical Society to have Macy Lawrence digitize whaling logs from Falmouth vessels. Our three whaling logs are those of the whale ship *Hobomak* and cover the dates 1848-1853, 1853-1855 and 1856.

The logs are too fragile to be repeatedly handled by researchers and the images, when printed, will provide ready access to the vast amount of information contained. Macy has already spent three days working with a special rig under rather arduous conditions on this project.

The Museum has received a \$1000. grant from the Willett Foundation Fund of the Cape Cod Foundation. We are grateful for this annual support.

This pram was built by Ted Tavares, assisted by Bob Spates. This was a project taught by Bob Leary to introduce the boat builders to the new method of "stitch and glue". Although initially distrustful and scornful of this technique, both Ted and Bob learned to appreciate its simplicity, although Ted still says "It's not my cup of tea." When launch day arrived, everyone was impressed with its seaworthiness. In keeping with the newly formalized guidelines of the Boat Restoration committee, it will be sold at market value, offered first to museum members.
